Dear Friends,

I'd like you to do something on Sunday morning: look around the sanctuary and see how many people you know who are at least 20 years older or 20 years younger than you are. (Okay, if you are under 20 you don't have to look for younger people, and if you are over 70, you don't have to look for older ones!)

So much of our lives are spent with people who grew up when we did, love the same music we do, and have the same historical memories as we have. When I was working as a developmental psychologist, we used the term "cohort" to describe people who were born in the same era. We all stay, more or less, in the same cohort for our whole lives.

Our cohorts provide important support and companionship as we move through our lives. People in our cohort understand what we are going through and what it means for us. The landmarks in our lives happen pretty much at the same time: raising kids, buying homes, coaching soccer, retiring, and the like.

The dark side of a cohort's support and companionship is the limited view it gives us of life. Inadvertently, we isolate ourselves from the activities and issues that we are not currently experiencing. We forget that people of other ages have wisdom, energy, and insight that would be gifts to us – if we only connected with them.

More and more I believe that one of the particular gifts of church life is the opportunity to bridge the gaps between the ages. To be in the sanctuary at the beginning of a Sunday service is to enjoy the company of people who range in age from a few weeks to many decades old.

But just seeing each other in church is not enough to forge the strong bonds

that we need to be spiritual companions for one another. We need to take time to become genuinely acquainted with one another – to know names and share our interests, hopes, worries, and stories with the people we share pews with.

So, if you don't know (really know) at least a few people who are not in your cohort, now is the time to change that. If you usually chat in the sanctuary after church, go into the Assembly Room instead and have a cookie with a child or youth. If you usually go right to the Assembly Room, stay in the sanctuary and chat with some of the elders who are visiting there. If you always talk to people you already know, make a point of speaking with someone who is new to you.

I cherish our church as a nurturing place for all ages, and I hope that you will take the time and make the effort to be sure that you are including people of all ages in your own circle of hospitality, friendship, and care.

One Great Hour of Sharing, as part of Our Church's Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in more than eighty countries. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water and food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, emergency relief, and advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons. OGHs also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness.

For example, people living in camps in Darfur depend on humanitarian aid agencies for all their basic needs: food, water, shelter and essential household items. But with community centers in eleven camps, ACT-Caritas is providing something more: These centers help people overcome trauma. Funds from the One Great Hour of Sharing offering and designated gifts are supporting this important ministry.

Our gifts are needed now for this and other ministries, at home and abroad. During the coming weeks, the Service

and Social Responsibility Committee will illustrate these ministries as we prepare locally to help the national United Church of Christ meet the goal of \$100,000 in support.

March is Minnesota FoodShare Month

March is Minnesota FoodShare Month. The CAC has set 90,000 dollars and/ or pounds fundraising goal. Once again, the Service and Social Responsibility Committee will coordinate the First UCC communications and collection of monetary and food for this year's drive.

According to the CAC, the Food Shelf served 330 households a month in 2007. (This means over 900 individuals benefited from the program monthly!) The need for this important resource is growing, as the 2007 usage was double the number served in 2000.

In spite of the increase, the Food Shelf has been able to meet the need of the individuals and families it serves. As a community, we can take pride in this achievement.

However, we all know that the economy is faltering and that this affects many of our neighbors' ability to make ends meet. Therefore, as a congregation, we will want to bear this in mind as we prepare to respond to the CAC's call for assistance. During the coming weeks, the SSRC will do our best to keep this important program visible, and to suggest ways families and individuals can help keep those shelves filled.

Donations of food may be placed in the receptacle near the southwest entrance. Checks should be made out to Community Action Center Food Shelf, with UCC in the memo line, and may be placed in the collection plate during worship.

- **March 9:** Eco-Palms. Dean Current (Program Director for the Center for Integrated Natural Resources and Agricultural Management at the University of Minnesota) will talk about his program to market palms to churches and preserve indigenous forest communities in Latin America.

He is a Minnesota native but, starting with a stint in the Peace Corps in El Salvador after college, has spent most of his career working in natural-resource-based development efforts in Latin America, primarily Central America, but has also worked in South America and Southeast Asia. He has been working with the Eco-Palm project since carrying out a market study of the palm in the years 2000 and 2001. He has contributed to making palm harvest more sustainable, developed certification guidelines for harvest, generating greater income for forest communities, and created a market that will drive that process.

The program began in 2005 with 20 American churches that bought about 5,000 palms. In 2007, the numbers have grown to 1,436 churches distributing 364,000 eco-palm stems on Palm Sunday.
