

A note about today's music

The choir's anthems today represent over five hundred years of musical history, telling the story of Christ in medieval and modern ways.

The English composer Sasha Johnson Manning has written many dozens of solo songs and anthems for choirs, including *Your enjoyment of the world*, which our church commissioned in 2006. Today's anthem, *Annunciation*, comes from the larger work *The Manchester Carols*, with new texts by English poet laureate Carol Ann Duffy.

Gilles Binchois, a fifteenth-century composer who lived in what is now Belgium, sang in the choir of the Burgundian court and composed many sacred and secular anthems. His setting of the text of the Magnificat employs only a handful of musical phrases, but each is repeated in subtly different ways, with an energetic rhythm that brings Mary's prayer to life.

The popularity of Daniel Kantor's *Night of silence* is well deserved for the way in which his original melody and text, eminently singable on their own, harmonize perfectly with the familiar tune of *Silent night*. Now a business strategist and consultant, Kantor composed *Night of silence* while studying music at St. Thomas College (now St. Thomas University).

Malcolm Williamson was an organist, composer, nightclub pianist, and (from 1975 until his death in 2003) Master of the Queen's Music, and his organ work *O paradise* was included in the recent funeral of Queen Elizabeth II. Musical settings of the text of Revelation that include more jazz-inflected harmonies than today's anthem, *Dignus est agnus*, are likely to be few and far between.

First performed in 1742, George Frederick Handel's *Messiah* tells the story of Christ from the accounts of the Old Testament prophets through his birth, death, resurrection, and glorification in heaven. Though Handel's story goes far beyond the gospel account of Jesus' birth, the *Messiah*'s connection with Christmas goes back in the United States to 1818, when Boston's Handel and Haydn Society performed the complete oratorio on Christmas Day.
